As I sit reflecting on 2020 and how we navigated (and are still) through a global pandemic, the phrase that comes to mind is, "Well that was crazy!" Crazy it was! But, also stressful and wonderful all at the same time!

2020 started with a full schedule of marvelous Traveling Exhibits and local exhibits to bring to our region, speakers, classes, camps, plans to launch the public campaign and a potential of \$3 million in bonding to bring us down the homestretch to a 2020 groundbreaking and a new much needed facility.

March came with mandated closures and guidelines that made it nearly impossible to carry through with our programming. Or did it? We have heard many times that 2020 has been a year to be prepared to "pivot." I feel like what your museum staff have done is more of a "pirouette." It would have been very easy to shutter the windows and doors and close. Staff would have been laid off and certainly any plans for a new facility would have been put on hold indefinitely. Instead our Board of Directors allowed us the opportunity to once again, Re-imagine how we serve our region. We developed STEAM kits that held activities complete with all of the needed supplies to create a variety of projects. Help from several local residents and two grants enabled us to distribute hundreds of kits through the Boys & Girls Club, Lakes Crisis Center and schools from around the county at no charge to families experiencing hardship. Summer camps were held. We went virtual with our first camps of the season. It was amazing to see a camp all together virtually building their own computer and then playing video games against each other online. Summer brought hard choices. Open limitedly to the public and cancel summer camps or go by appointment and follow the guidelines to hold camps. We continued our dance and held camps, accommodated public requests for the Research Library or to tour the museum. We partnered with our neighbors and area food trucks to bring our gift shop and classes outside for 6 weeks with the Summit Ave Street Market. Fall presented us with the opportunity to host a very successful Haunted House at the fairgrounds and create new STEAM kits for the colder months.

All of this has not been easy. It speaks volumes to the energy and dedication of our small staff. We are entering what is always the slowest time of the year. Financially, it is daunting. "How can we keep doing the dance?", crosses my mind often but I remain the eternal optimist and have faith that we will continue to do our best to serve our region, fulfill our mission, and continue to be an active partner in our community meeting the needs of our region. Thank you for supporting us and other non-profits in our region. We have faith we will get through this together.

We are unable to hold our Annual Meeting this year. This newsletter will highlight our programming for the year. Stay safe. Stay healthy. We look forward to gathering with you soon!

Prior to the mandated closures in mid-March, we were able to "go out with a bang" with Music from the 60's with local musical duo (and museum members) 'Sweet Afton' during the "Coming of Age 1968" traveling exhibit.

We then spent March, April, & May creating, packaging, and delivering <u>sixteen different</u> DIY craft kits with a STEAM theme. (STEAM is an acronym for Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) In total, we have offered <u>**30 different DIY kits**</u> in 2020!

From May through August, we hosted weekly small group summer camps. We were able to host 16 camps on science, history, technology, art, and math in a safe, healthy environment thanks to guidance from the health department, grants, sanitizer, and staff ingenuity!

In October, we opened the Smithsonian's "Rightfully Hers: American Women & The Vote", the National Portrait Gallery's "Votes for Women: A Portrait of Persistence", and the League of Women Voters Minnesota's "A Century of Civic Engagement". All three can be viewed on our website under the EXHIBIT tab along with photos of temporary exhibit loans from our local museum members of electionrelated yard signs, pins, t-shirts, bumper stickers, photographs, and more.

After School STEAM club ran from fall 2019 to early spring 2020. We had a lot of great kids designing and building projects such as mazes and Newton's Cradle.

Summer Camps brought learning about different cultures, paint pendulums, zip lines, hot air balloons, bridges, circuits, many art projects and new techniques, and all sorts of opportunities to learn about Science, Technology, Math, Art, and Engineering.

We had two build your own computer camps where students built their own desktop computer and installed an operating system and additional programs. They also learned to code a video game and some on-line game functions using 3 different code methods. We used those same methods to program robots to do our work. Kids also learned to use a CAD program to create 3D objects on the 3D printer.





We were able to obtain and install Plexi shields for students to be isolated during class which allowed us to hold smaller classes during the pandemic. We have had to stock up on additional supplies to clean between students and provide each student with their own supplies to eliminate sharing.

- -a Learning & Science Center complete with a 3D Print Lab and Learning Lab for the messiest of classes.
- -classrooms and gathering spaces both inside and out to hold programming and events.
- -storage large enough to bring our complete collection to one climate-controlled space.
- -more collaborations with the DLCCC and Historic Holmes Theatre.

We invited you to Re-Imagine with us and you responded. Thank you!

Years of hard work by many for several years along with a visioning process and multiple plan revisions have brought us to this point. I often think of the MNHS saying, "when the right plan happens it will just all fall into place." That is EXACTLY what happened! A thought out plan developed with our stakeholders as well as the State awarding bonding of \$1.85 million, and pledges from our local county and city governments and YOU are turning a dire need into reality.
